This session will explore the importance of well designed activities and focus on how to set-up, monitor and adjust groups. "Got your back": Using Improv to foster collaboration	August 30, Thurs. 1 – 2.15	Applying the principles of improvised theatre in a classroom can help breathe life into numerous aspects of your pedagogy. Short, accessible improv exercises can be used as dynamic warmups for rigorous group activities such as brainstorming and idea-generating. Improv can foster many productive habits among groups, including: accepting offers, supporting teammates, taking risks, creative thinking, active listening, co-creation, and having fun. "I don't have time for group work": How to incorporate meaningful active learning into content-heavy Humanities & Arts classes	Sept. 14, Fri. 2:30 – 4.00	When we have a lot of content to teach in History, Philosophy, English, or Humanities classes, often the first-choice teachers make is to cut down on group work. Information needs to be transmitted! If you've found yourself in this scenario, this workshop is for you. This session will equip you with active learning strategies that can help you get this content across in an impactful way. We will specifically be looking at short, strategic classroom activities that can be used in conjunction with the demands of content heavy Arts and Humanities courses. "I can't do active learning, I have way too much content to cover!": How to incorporate meaningful active learning into content-heavy Science and Math courses	Sept. 14, Fri. 2:30 – 4.00	Sometimes it's hard to imagine how active learning strategies could be done in science and math courses because there's already so much content to "cover" and it's impossible to add anything more. But active learning is more about <i>uncovering</i> (misconceptions, trouble-spots and difficulties) than it is about <i>covering</i> (material), so the trick is to figure out how to get the students to cover the material while classtime is spent uncovering the material. In this session, teachers who have successfully been doing active learning in the sciences and math will explore what they do and how they do it. Active Learning Assessment Strategies	Sept. 27, Thurs. 11:30 – 12:45	Active Learning strategies are focussed on the engagement of learners as they construct knowledge so where does assessment fall into active learning and what are some strategies that fit with this pedagogical approach? It's a little less intuitive to imagine how writing, which can be more of a lonesome task, can be applied to an active learning context. At the same time, writing is a social act, and written texts, of course, have the power to change the world. This workshop will examine strategies and techniques for teaching writing in a more social, active-learning way.
